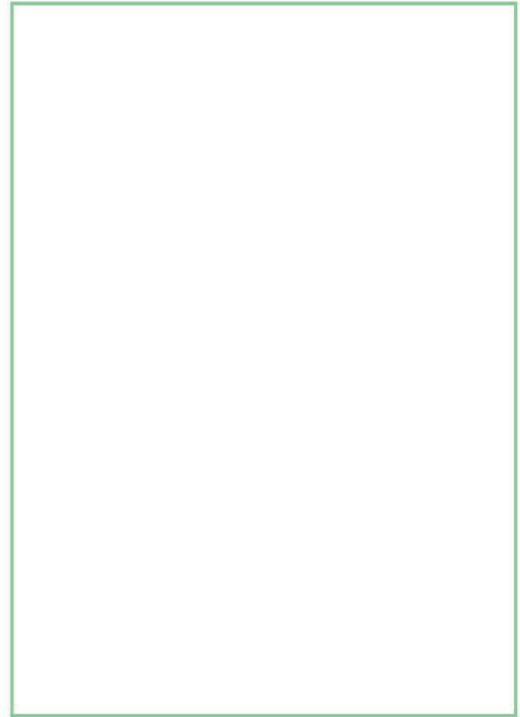


# Monkey Stove
