

# Mount Calvary

**Project time:** 40 minutes

## **Supplies:**

**Note:** The number of projects listed after each linked supply shows how many projects you can make from each item.

- [10" wood round](#) - 1 - 5 projects
- Mount Calvary template
- Paint
  - White - 4 tsp.
  - Light yellow - ¼ tsp.
  - Dark orange - ¼ tsp.
  - Orange - ¼ tsp.
  - Light pink - ¼ tsp.
  - Dark yellow - 1 tsp.
- [White puff paint](#) - 3 tsp. - 8 projects
- Medium paintbrush
- Masking tape
- Clear sticker paper - 1 Sheet
- Printer paper - 2 Sheets
- It's Always A Mountain printable
- Pencil
- Water cup
- Paper towel
- Scissors

## **For a class setting:**

- Cut out templates and stickers before class.
- Measure out/premix paint colors for each student.

### Tips:

- Feel free to use any paint colors you like. To make the colors we used for this project, mix 1 tsp of white paint with each of the colors listed, except dark yellow.
- Be careful not to smudge puff paint. Give it plenty of time to dry before you touch it.

### Steps:

1. Print Mount Calvary template on printer paper and cut out. There will be 6 pieces. Print “It’s Always A Mountain” printable on sticker paper and cut out. Mix paint colors; set aside.
2. Tape the template in place using masking tape.
3. Use a pencil and trace the template onto the wood round, starting with the top section. Remove template. Use video as a guide for placement, and repeat with remaining templates.
4. Working top to bottom, paint all the sections of Mount Calvary with whatever paint color you choose. **Note- Don’t fill in the Crosses and the stone just yet.** For the sky, paint a coat of yellow. While paint is still wet, alternate different colors of yellow and orange, and blend together to make a sunrise look. Continue painting each section a different color. Allow to dry.
5. Apply “It’s Always a Mountain” sticker over the sun.
6. Use puff paint and fill in the Crosses and the stone. Trace around each section to add detail. Add seven sunbeams over the sun. Allow to dry.
