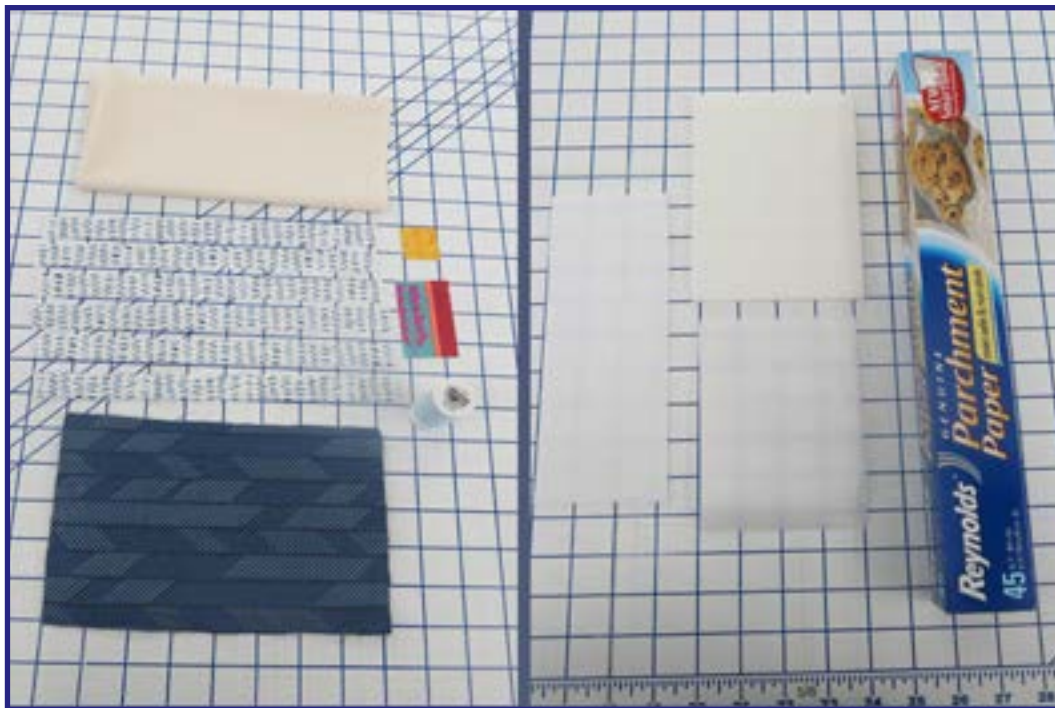

TUTORIAL

**The seam allowance throughout the project will be 1/4", along the presser foot edge, unless told otherwise.

materials needed:

- COTTON FABRIC PIECE 16 X 16 INCHES
- FOR THE CABIN CUT 1 FABRIC PIECE 8 X 5 1/2 INCHES
- FOR ROOF SHINGLES-CUT 6 STRIPS OF FABRIC 9 1/2 X 1 1/2 INCHES
- FOR THE CABIN DOOR CUT 1 FABRIC PIECE 3 X 3 INCHES
- FOR THE AMBER LIGHT CUT 1 AMBER COLORED FABRIC PIECE 2 X 2 INCH
- 1 PIECE FLEX FOAM 1 SIDED FUSIBLE STABILIZER CUT 6 1/2 X 4 1/2 INCHES
- FOR THE ROOF 1 PIECE FUSIBLE FLEECE STABILIZER 4 X 9 INCHES
- 1 PIECE WONDER UNDER CUT 14 X 15 INCHES
- 1 PIECE PARCHMENT PAPER 10 X 10 INCHES

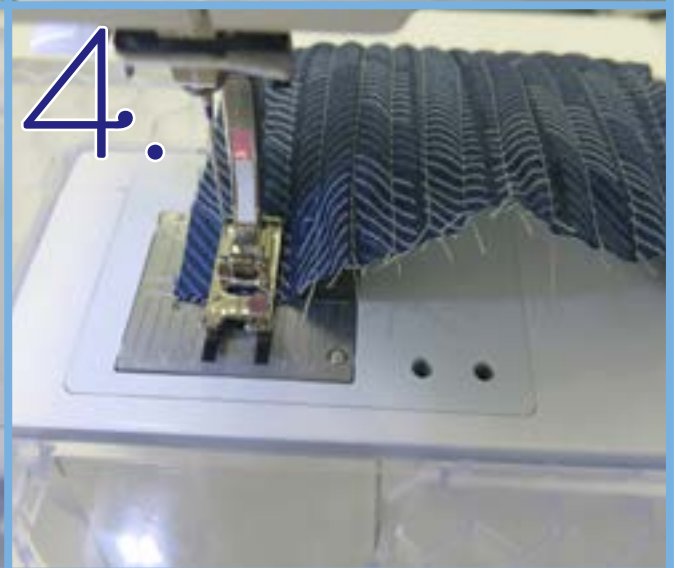


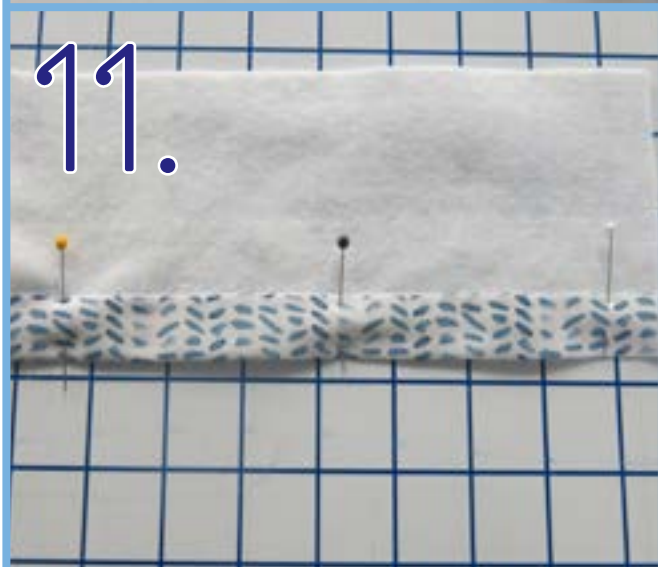
steps:

1. Center one-sided adhesive foam on the wrong side of the cabin fabric.
2. Use parchment paper and apply the foam according to product directions.
3. Move the stitch length to 3.8 inches and the needle all the way to the left. Use the outside, right edge of the presser foot as your guide to sew down the long side of the cabin.
4. Line up the outside, right edge of the presser foot with the row of stitching you just completed and sew to the end. Continue until you reach the other side of the cabin. Remember to clip your threads as you go.
5. Take the cabin to the ironing board, fold the edges of the fabric around the foam and press them down. Flip it over and make sure the sides and corners look nice.
6. Take the fabric you are putting the cabin on, fold it in half to create a rectangle and then fold the rectangle in half to create a square. Gently press the folded edges to mark the center.
7. Take the rectangle of Wonder-under[®] and center in on the foam side of the cabin apply according to the product directions.
8. Gently peel off the paper backing.
9. Place the cabin 1.5 inch up from the center horizontal line (* this will be the top of the cabin) and center it with the vertical line. Press it in place.
10. Move the needle all the way to the right side. Use the presser foot as a guide and sew around the cabin. When you get to the corner, stop with the needle in the down position and lift the presser foot to pivot. Put the presser foot back down and sew the next side. Sew the 2 sides and the bottom. You don't have to sew across the top, but you can if you want to.
11. Take the adhesive fleece and lay it with the soft side facing up. Lay the first shingle at the bottom with the folded edge hanging off about $\frac{1}{4}$ in and pin it down.
12. With the needle all the way to the right and the outside, right edge of the presser foot as guide, sew along the raw edge of the shingle.
13. Lay the next shingle on top of the first one so it covers a little bit of the last row of stitches, pin it down and sew it the same way you did the last one. Sew the rest of the shingles on the same way.

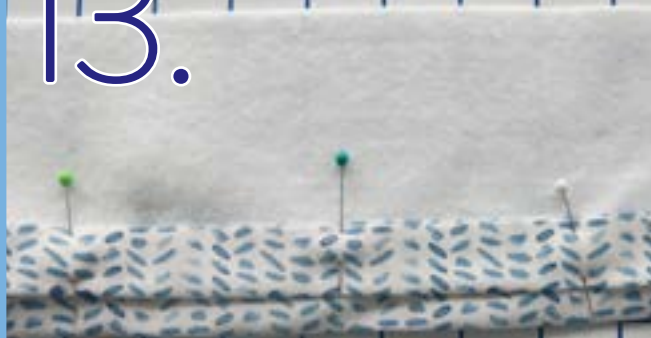
14. Trim the extra fleece from the top of the roof.
15. Trim up the sides of the roof to give it a roof like shape.
16. Place the roof just above the horizontal fold and make sure it is centered. Attach according to the adhesive fleece directions.
17. Use a zig-sag stitch or a decorative stitch to sew down the sides and top of the roof.
18. Apply wonder-under to the back of the door and light fabrics according to the product directions and then cut to door down to the correct size.
19. Draw a window in the door and cut it out.
20. Peel the paper backing from the door and light. Place the light behind the window and set them both on the cabin. Adjust the door to where you would like it and make sure the window is covering the whole light and apply to the cabin.
21. Use a zigzag with a .8 inch length to sew around the door and window. You can also sew across the middle and make planks by sewing down from that row of stitching.
22. Use a non-permanent parking pen or chalk and draw a line down the center of the roof. Use this line as a starting guide to draw a line every in all the way across the roof on both sides.
23. Carefully cut along each line, making sure you stop cutting before the seam.
24. Erase the lines from the shingles and fluff them. Check for any long threads and trim them.

You have finished your cabin! You can leave it like it is and frame it or you can turn it into a pillow or a wall hanging.

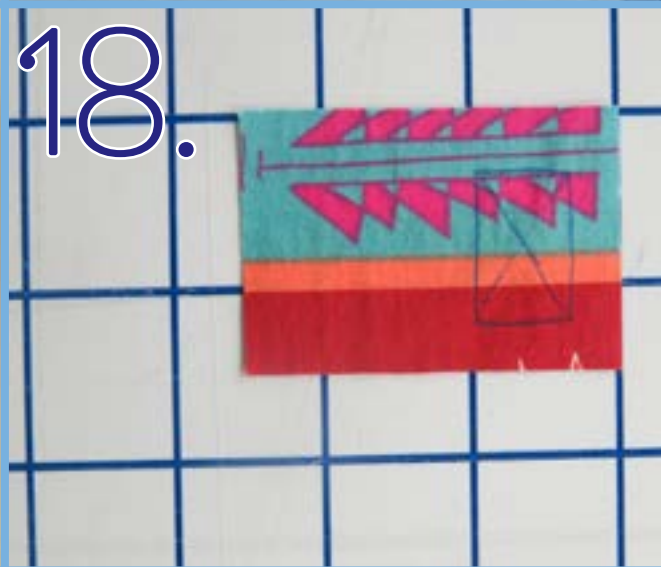
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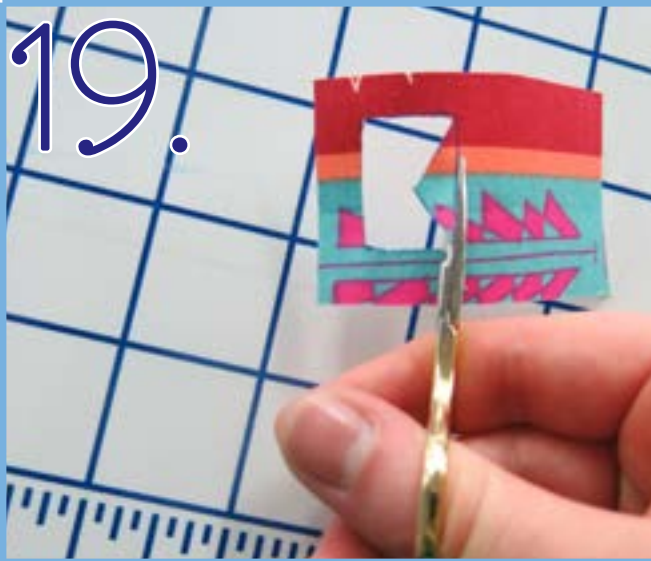

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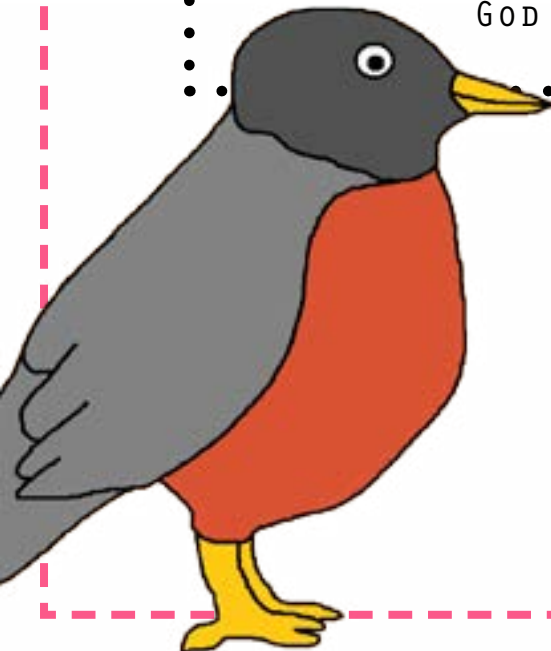
