

## Supplies needed:


- 12" wooden Kentucky cutout
- 3/4" wooden letters
- 1 sheet of printer paper or clear matte sticker paper
- Polymer clay
  - brown
  - yellow
- 3 different shades of green
- Tree sticker
- 3-5 different shades of green acrylic paint

- Red acrylic paint
- Small and medium paintbrushes
- Clay scoring tool or butter knife
- Rolling pin
- Small star sticker
- 1 1"x1 3/8" rectangle wood or foam piece
- 1 1"x1" circle wood or foam piece
- Glue stick
- Mod Podge: if using printer paper
- Baking pan
- Parchment paper





Paint your "KENTUCKY" letters and a "4".



Roll out your brown polymer clay and make a small 2"x2" log cabin and shingled roof.




Take your yellow clay and form the Pillar of Fire.



Use a green clay and make a tacky button.



Make small press plays out of your green clay. Bake your clay on parchment paper placed on a baking pan at 275 degrees Fahrenheit for 10-15 minutes. The bake time will vary depending on your oven. Check clay while baking often.



Use a dab of red paint to put some apples on your tree.



Cut out your stickers.



Place the first vision sketch and 4 squirrels sticker on the wood pieces.



Line up "KENTUCKY" along the bottom of the state.
Use the glue stick to attach the letters.



On the right side of the state, add the apple tree, squirrels, number "4", and the press play pieces. Place the "Sportsman's Hollow", "gray squirrels", Kentucky words, small star sticker and "April 6, 1909 - Burkesville" stickers.



On the left side of the state, place the press plays, beans and cornbread, Brother Branham, and the first vision pieces and stickers.



In the space that is open, attach your log cabin and the Pillar of Fire.


